Daniel Chodowiecki was the most successful graphic artist of 18th-century Germany, often being compared to Hogarth, yet he initially trained as a miniature painter. It was as a miniaturist that he became a member of Akademie der Künste, Berlin where he organised the first of the academy's annual exhibitions in 1786, and rose through the ranks to eventually become director in 1797. Today, many his drawings and prints can be found in public institutions across Europe as well as in the USA, but few of his miniatures.

Chodowiecki was born in 1726 in Danzig (modern day Gdańsk, Poland) into a Polish-Huguenot family. An apprenticeship with a merchant took him to Berlin in 1743, but, having been drawing and painting from a young age, he soon abandoned commerce to become a professional miniaturist.

Chodowiecki worked in a range of media to produce portrait miniatures and snuffbox miniatures, including watercolour on ivory, enamel, oil on metal and plumbago. He is thought to have taught himself etching around 1750, his early work receiving good critical reception, but it was not until after 1770 that etching would eclipse his miniature practice.

The subject here appears to be an Italian composer, the sheet music he holds inscribed 'arate' and

‘Autumnliche’ (autumnal). It likely represents Domenico Cimarosa (1749–1801), a major figure of Italian opera. A Neapolitan native, Cimarosa was a prolific composer. Renowned for skilled storytelling, the majority of his works were comedies and he is credited as the founder of the comic opera as it is today.

Cimarosa’s success reached beyond Italy, and in 1787 he was invited to Saint Petersburg by Catherine the Great. He would stay in Russia for several years composing and reworking a number of pieces for the imperial court. While Cimarosa travelled, including to Warsaw and working for several years at the court of Leopold II in Vienna, Chodowiecki seems to have worked primarily from Berlin. It may be therefore, that Chodowiecki painted this portrait from an engraving, which he described doing himself.
