This is a highly attractive example of Andrews's *en grisaille* profile portraits, most of which he produced during his time in Calcutta. The dress and hairstyle worn by the sitter here suggest it was painted circa 1800, therefore during the artist's time in India.

Andrews, Irish by birth, appears to have worked in Bath prior to 1791, the year he followed several British artists journeying to India in pursuit of the lucrative patronage of the British colonies. Andrews disembarked in Madras, where he became a follower of miniaturist John Smart (1741-1811). In 1795, Andrews married and moved into Smart's house when Smart returned to England. Andrews moved to Calcutta in 1798, where he was painted similar portrait miniatures *en grisaille* by a young Arthur Wellesley (1769–1852), later Duke of Wellington, and his brothers Henry Wellesley, 1st baron Cowley (1773-1847) and Richard, 1st Marquess Wellesley (1760-1824), all served with the British Army in India.
